Enrichment of curriculum is done at the college level by arranging guest lectures & holding seminars in appropriate topics.

Maximum usage of ICT is being done to make Teaching & Learning more effective. This includes the use of LCD Projectors, OHP & Internet & well stocked automated Library

The Library is finally automated which makes issues/returns/searches very easy & effective. ICT is used to an optimum level to enhance the performance of the teachers in class-rooms. Well established labs & extremely comfortable class rooms makes the students feel comfortable & relaxed in the class room.

The consumption of electricity was drastically reduced by the installation of Solar Panels on the roof top of our college premises. About 20,000 watts of electricity is being generated on all sunny days and also transmitted to the state electricity grid. Artificial light is not used in class rooms as they are well ventilated to allow air and sun light.

Installation of Solar Panels on the roof – top of our premises is generating 20,000 watts of electricity. The extra electricity generated is passed on to the Govt. Electricity grid, when usage is not in the college. The electricity bills have been reduced by 50%, since the usage of solar energy.

BEST PRACTICES

1. The Practice

This concept of dissemination of knowledge with the help of lectures, models, posters, exhibitions sounded interesting and feasible at the beginning. Students got ready with their models and charts and started practicing their verbal and visual presentations for several days. The main challenge before them was how to simplify the concepts to suit the young minds and make it understandable and palatable. Under the able guidance of faculty a "PPPP" Plan for student presentation was developed - "Prepare, Plan, Practice, Preach". Once the teachers were sure that the "4P" plan was perfected by all the participating students, then they were put on the launch pad and taken to the real field. The transition from virtual to real was an exhilarating experience for the participants. The school children responded with the same kind of interest in events, as the topics discussed therein touched the hearts of all children as they were concerned about most of the issues which were contemporary.

Every topic of discussion chosen was presented in the form of lecture, model, poster which made communication easy. The 20 topics chosen in the first spell are as follows:-

- Diseases spread by mosquitoes

Career plan

We felt that this kind of "knowledge Adoptions" would go a long way in spreading awareness and knowledge amongst the school children in building their personality and character. It's true that regular curriculum is being taught to them in the class rooms but discussion on topics and areas other than those in the text books, is beyond the scope of teaching schedule. This limitation with the school curriculum prompted us to adopt these two schools for elucidating these extracurricular topics. The schools were chosen after a formal survey and it was then decided to initiate our act of Institutional Social Responsibility by adopting two schools, one for boys and one for girls, Government Model High School for Boys, Aliya and Government Mahbubia Girls High School, Hyderabad.

1. The Practice

The Management is sensitive to the issues of electricity utilization & its shortages with frequent shutdowns and with escalating costs of electricity, running the college curriculum was becoming difficult. It was then that the Management decided to go for installation of solar panels on the roof top of the college To improve the electricity generation, a tracking device was also installed which helps the solar panels to face the sun from sunrise to sunset, thereby increasing the generating power by about 30%. Since the cost of installation of solar panels is too high, the Ministry of New and Renewable Energy, Government of India has extended a small subsidy. The solar panels installed can generate about 20 KW (20,000 watts) of electric power which is sufficient to meet the needs of the college in the day time. To bring down the cost of the installation, storage devices (Batteries) were avoided as electricity was not required in the college after sunset. After the installation of these solar panels the electricity bills were cut down drastically. More important, it gave a moral satisfaction to us that we are producing pollution free electricity without causing any damage to the environment or contributing to global warming.

However, the most remarkable feature of this project undertaken is that, while there is a mechanism for utilization of electricity generated by the Solar panels on all working days, there is built-in system in the machinery which transmits the electricity produced to the City's Electric Grid on holidays, Vacation and after closure of the college in the evening. This act on our part is in accordance with "Institutional Social Responsibility".

The quantity of electricity produced and contributed to Grid for public use could be small, but is very significant. The power transmitted to the Grid is measured and money is paid to the institution by the Electricity Department, Government of Telangana for producing and sharing electricity.

The Management strongly believes that every unit of electricity saved is one unit of electricity produced. But here is an instance that literally we are acting as electricity generating station and contributing our mite to overcome the shortages faced by our city.
